2. The response to your query w.r.t. to China is as follows:

China disputes the international boundary between India and China, Indian territory under the accupation of China in Jammu & Kashmir is approximately 38,000 sq. Kms, In addition, under the so-called China-Pakistan "Boundary Agreement" signed between China and Pakistan on 2 March, 1963, Pakistan illegally ceded 5,180 sq kms, of Indian territory in Pakistan Occupied Kashmir to China. The fact that Jammu & Kashmir is an integral and inalienable pat of India has been clearly conveyed to the Chinese side on several occasions, including at the highest level.

There is no commonly delineated Line of Actual Control (LAC) in the border areas between India and China.

The two sides have agreed to appoint a Special Representative (SR) to explore the framework for a boundary settlement from the political perspective of the overall bilateral relationship. The 18th round of Special Representatives Talks on the India-China boundary question was held in New Delhi from March 22-24,2015. The Special Representatives of the two countries, Shri Ajit Daval, National Security Advisor and Mr. Yang Jiechi, State Councilor held useful and positive discussions on the framework for the settlement of the India-China boundary question on the basis of the Agreement on the Political Parameters and Guiding Principles for the Settlement of the India-China Boundary Question signed on April 11, 2005. The two delegations reviewed the situation prevailing in the India-China border areas and focused on the need to adhere to the various agreements for maintenance of peace and tranquillity, which is a pre-requisite for continued growth of bilateral relations.

The two Special Representatives affirmed the consensus to seek a fair, reasonable and mutually acceptable solution to the boundary question through consultations on an equal footing, proceeding from the political perspective of overall bilateral relations.
